[April Queen 2 W-YYO](#) Mid Season to Late Historic 4 bulbs/\$5

Beautifully formed, with an ivory-white perianth and a bright lemon-yellow cup with an orange, ribbed edge. April Queen is a good naturalizer.

[Chromacolor 2 W-P](#) Mid-Season 4 bulbs/\$5

Outer petals of pure white with a distinctive large pink cup. Long flowering period and very floriferous.

[Crewenna 1 W-Y](#) Very Early 4 bulbs/\$8

One of the earliest to flower with pure white petals and a deep yellow cup.

N. jonquilla Early Louisiana 13 Y-Y Early 4 bulbs/\$5

“For generations, the sweetest smelling flower in the garden,” Its clusters of nickel-sized flowers with tiny cups are an attraction to all.

[Edward Buxton 3 Y-OOR](#) Mid-Season Historic 4 bulbs/\$8

Blooms have lemon-yellow petals surrounding an orange cup. Excellent naturalizer.

[Fragrant Rose 2 W-GPP](#) Mid-Season to Late 4 bulbs/\$5

Said to have the fragrance of raspberries and roses. The flower has ivory petals and a long cup-shaped corona of deep reddish-pink growing paler towards its green base.

[Irene Copeland 4 W-Y](#) Mid-Season Historic 4 bulbs/\$5

Blooms have pointed, white petals and yellow corona segments. May produce more than one bloom to a stem.

[Julia Jane 10 Y-Y](#) Mid-Season to Late Miniature **3 bulbs/\$12**

Funnel-shaped flowers with grass-like foliage. This variety does very well in pots.

[Katie Heath 5 W-P](#) Mid-Season **4 bulbs/\$5**

Usually more than one flower to a stem. Has a slightly reflexed, ivory perianth and a beautiful, large, cup-shaped crown in varying shades of apricot-pink.

[Mary Gay Lirette 11a Y-P](#) Mid-Season **3 bulbs/\$8**

This blossom opens with a yellow cup, quickly turning salmon, folding back against white petals; this flower is as beautiful, strong and sturdy as was its namesake.

[Pink Wonder 11 a W-YYP](#) Mid-Season **4 bulbs/\$8**

Ivory petals overlaid with gently frilled, split corona petals that subtly blend from apricot-pink to golden-apricot with a chartreuse-yellow center.

[Sentinel 2 W-P](#) Mid-Season to Late **4 bulbs/\$8**

It shades-of-pink cup pales as it matures, often fading to an ivory cup with a pale pink rim toward the end of its show.

[Slim Whitman 2 W-YYO](#) Early to Mid-Season **4 bulbs/\$5**

A 1978 sport of Ice Follies, it has an ivory-white perianth and a nasturtium-orange cup with a sulfur-yellow edged rim.

[Spoirot 10 Y-Y](#) Very Early Miniature **4 bulbs/\$8**

Bloom deeply bowl shaped. Does very well in pots.

[Trevithian 7 Y-Y](#) Mid-Season to Late Historic **4 bulbs/\$5**

Quoting from a 1937 article, "its flowers are usually borne in twos and threes, and are shallow cupped, soft clear self yellow of faultless form and the loveliest quality."

Early to Midseason Historic

This tough species flower is especially suited to full sun and mediocre soils; also called "Texas Stars" or "Etoile d'Or"; north Florida grown.

[N. x medioluteus div 13](#)

Late season

This historic species traditionally closed out the daffodil season in early April, from DeKalb County. Tolerates light shade.

[N. italicus div 13](#)

Early season Historic

An uncommon species tazettas, needs full sun and a warm location.

[Tresamble 5 W-W](#)

Late Midseason to Late Historic

One of the most dependable white daffodils for light shade. From north Florida.

[Queen of the North 3 W-Y](#)

Midseason to Late Midseason

Grown-on "rescues" from north Florida. This historic is one of the most robust Division 3 whites for our area, and come heat acclimated!
